

Suggestions on Obtaining Articles

You should be able to get all the articles without having to pay for them. You might have to go through the library to do so. Start by looking at the list of the library's [journal holdings, both the electronic version and in print](#). A good tool that they have is something called "[Citation Linker](#)", which should tell you if the library has an electronic copy of the article, or if they have it in print.

The library also has access to some good [databases](#) that have these papers, for example [JSTOR](#) or [ScienceDirect](#). For those, you will definitely need to use your UWW net-id and try to access them through the library, since the library subscribes to those databases. If the library does not have them, then they would be able to get a hold of them through interlibrary lending.

Some other databases that you might wish to try are [EconLit](#) and [Web of Science](#), both of which are accessible through the library, [RePEc \(Research Papers in Economics\)](#), which sometimes has links that will allow you to download directly, or sometimes you can also access a working paper version of the article too from there. Otherwise, it has links directly to the publishers, and then you would have to access those via the library instead of following the links directly.

An alternative suggestion might be to search for the author's homepages. Sometimes lots of professors put working paper versions of past papers and things that they are currently working on, online. They may have posted a past working paper version of the article (since copyright laws typically prohibit them from posting the published version of the article without the publisher's consent).
